WHY JOIN?

- **Choose to join as a Soldier or Officer**, depending on your qualifications, experience and the type of career you want.
- **Get tuition fees paid for and a full-time salary** while at university, or receive a bursary.

WHAT YOU NEED TO JOIN

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW.

Student Nurse (Soldier): Complete your degree with us, earning money and with no tuition fees. You will need **120 UCAS points plus 3 GCSEs Grades 9-4** including **Maths, English Language** and one of the following: **Health and Social Care, Biology, Chemistry, Physics or Science double/triple award** or equivalent.

Bursary (Officer): If you have already gained your Student Nurse university place, are in the process of applying or are part way through your training you are eligible to apply for an Army Nursing Bursary of up to £42,000. You will join as a Nursing Officer once you qualify.

There are also routes to join as a **Registered Nurse (Soldier or Officer)**.



SALARY AND BENEFITS

Student Nurse (Soldier): around £16,000 during initial soldier training, over £21,000 a year during university, and over £32,000 upon qualification and first posting.

Bursary (Officer): Around £27,000 during officer training, rising to a minimum of £35,000 depending on experience. (Plus Army Nursing Bursary of up to £42,000 during university.)

Opportunity to specialise and significant personal and professional development.



I did my degree in Adult Nursing at Birmingham City University, which the Army paid for as well as giving me a wage. This meant I graduated with no student debt. I'm now working in an NHS hospital, but about to deploy overseas.
