

ACTIVITY IDEAS FOR USING THE HIGHER AND DEGREE LISTING IN YOUR LESSONS

Try some of these activity ideas to maximise student engagement with the listing. Encourage students to think carefully and thoroughly about the options available.



Students select a role, research it, and present it to the class (or make a video).

What are the main features of this role that should be shared? You could give them some ideas of what to include in the presentation, or leave it to them to decide the most important elements.



Students select a role, research it, create a job interview script and perform it for the class.

What do they think are the types of questions that the interviewer would ask, and what would some of their exemplar responses include? You could give them some question ideas to get them started.



Students select the role they are most interested in and tailor their CV as if they were applying for the position.

Students select the role they are most interested in and look at the job advert/specification.

Ask students to consider what they could say for each element of the criteria. If they feel they can't meet any part of it, ask them to think about what they could do over the next 6-12 months to try and develop their experience.



Students select an interesting role and write a covering letter as if they're applying.

Students select the employer they are most interested in and research them.

Ask students to thoroughly research the employer, not just by looking at their website, but by looking at their social media, news articles, adverts and anything else that would show off that they have really done their research.
